Online Safety

Our work around Online Safety and particularly social media continued during Terms 3 and 4, following our whole school support of Internet Safety Day. May I also take this opportunity to remind everyone that, as a school, we continue to work hard to teach the children how to use social media both responsibly and respectfully. Your support in demonstrating this to your child is greatly appreciated. Should you have any concerns please do not hesitate to come in to school to discuss them.

Recently, within Lincolnshire, there has been an increase in children accessing inappropriate content online and also seen an increase in inappropriate use of social media. Please see below guidance from Community Safety Service regarding ways that parents/carers can support specifically in relation to online safety.

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Inappropriate Content Online Advice for Parents from Community Safety Service

Over the last few months, we have seen an increase in the number of schools reporting that students, while at home, have accessed content which is not always appropriate, some of which has been quite scary or upsetting. We have also had a report of worrying trends on TikTok encouraging nudity from its users. This can have legal implications for our children and young people that they often aren't aware of.

While there is no perfect way to eliminate this risk, we feel that there are things parents and carers can do to support their children online, reduce the risk or manage it after the fact. Remember to keep lines of Communication open with your children and young people. Just like we ask them how their day was at school and what they got up to it is equally important to have this conversation about their Online lives. If you can keep technology out of the bedrooms and private spaces this is also an effective tool in safeguarding our children.

Here are some more practical steps parents and carers can follow:

- Contact their Internet Service Provider (ISP): Companies that provide broadband such as BT, Sky and Virgin, offer free protection for parents and carers. They can filter your internet connection directly, without having to install anything. Guide on how to use this can be found here: https://www.internetmatters.org/parental-controls/broadband-mobile/
- YouTube is a fantastic resource, but not all the content is appropriate for children and not all YouTube channels are made for young audiences. YouTube has an app just for children YouTube Kids but many people don't realise that the main YouTube app has a restricted mode. - Games consoles have features that can limit what games they can play based on the age ratings and can even turn off certain features to allow gaming to be a little safer. To learn more about these features visit https://www.internetmatters.org/parental-controls/qaming-consoles/
- Games are also rated based on the content; not how difficult they are. 18 rated games can have very graphic violence, adult language and themes, sexual content, and horror elements.

It's important to remember that no filters or controls are 100% effective so make sure your child knows that they can, and should, talk to someone if they see or hear anything upsetting online so we can offer them some reassurance. Parish Post

As part of our provision in school we regularly review our procedures and systems. This includes things like the Parish Post so we can ensure parents and carers are receiving the most relevant information about school and the information they feel would be useful. The intention of the Parish Post is to share information with you about school and as such we would like to include, if feasible, aspects that are prevalent for parents and carers.

Parking

Please remember to park courteously for the safety of all our community whilst respecting our neighbours. Please park legally allowing the safe use of the road and pavements for all. Do not park on the public footpath as it makes it dangerous with the numbers of people using them.

If you are just dropping your child off, please park up and ensure their safe exit from the vehicle on to the pavement so they can then walk safely into school. The closer to school you get the more congested it is so if you are able to park further away or even walk all the way to and from school this would be appreciated, particularly given the promise of improved weather ahead.

We continue to receive a small number of complaints from local neighbours where driveways are being blocked as a result of parking. We are all a community and it is important that we work together for the benefit of all. If you could please bear our neighbours in mind when parking, this would be very much appreciated.

Pertussis (Whooping Cough)

The UK Health Security Agency (UKHSA East Midlands Health Protection team) has identified an increase in confirmed or suspected cases of whooping cough (pertussis) in school age children across the East Midlands region. With this in mind we would like to take this opportunity to raise awareness regarding vaccination and symptoms of whooping cough to be aware of.

Symptoms

Whooping cough is caused by infection with pertussis bacteria. For most school-age patients, symptoms will resolve over a number of weeks, while for some, coughing can persist for a few months.

The symptoms of pertussis include:

- -a cough lasting several weeks following initial cold-like symptoms
- -prolonged bouts of coughing ('paroxysms')
- -post-coughing retching or vomiting
- -a 'whoop' sound on breathing in
- -rib pain

Polling Day – Thursday 2nd May

As you will know, there are local elections taking place on Thursday 2nd May and our school hall will be used as a Polling Station as it has done for many years previously. Lunches

On that day children will not be able to eat lunches in the hall so the kitchen will not be cooking hot lunches. They will however be making sandwiches so that children can still order a school lunch. The online ordering system on ParentPay has the option for you to choose a sandwich meal for your child should you wish to order one; all children will then eat their lunches in their classrooms.

The cut off time for ordering meals for that week will be Tuesday 23rd April.

Unfortunately, we will not be able to offer bagels that morning due to the hall being out of use to us. They will start again the following day.

Sun Safety

Over the weekend we have seen the arrival of a little sunshine and warmer weather, with this in mind could we please ask that you send your child into school prepared for the weather. If you could please ensure your child has a hat to keep the sun off their head during the times of the day when they are outside and a drinks bottle in school each day filled with fresh water to ensure your child stays hydrated in the warmer weather.
