Choose a text and answer the following questions:

- Where does the story take place?
- When did the story take place?
- What do you think is happening towards the end of the story?
- Through whose eyes is the story told?
- Can you think of another story which has a similar theme e.g. good over evil, weak over strong, wise over foolish?
- What part of the story do you like best?
- How could you make the story better?
- Comprehension Shed Reading: Counting
- Create a book spine story. The titles of the books need to create a simple story.
- Read to another member of the family. This doesn't have to be a book so you can be as imaginative as you wish.

Spelling Tasks (Aim to do 1 per day)

- Practise the Year 5/6 Common Exception Words (see list in Home Learning Pack).
- Choose 5 Common Exception words. Write a synonym, an antonym, the meaning and an example of how to use the word in a sentence. Can you use the word in two different sentences?
- Practise spellings on <u>Spelling Frame</u>.
- Create a vocabulary bank about the feelings you have felt over the week. How descriptive can you make your feelings?
- Proofread your writing from the day. You can use a dictionary to check the spelling of any words that you found challenging. This will also enable you to check that the meaning of the word is suitable for the sentence.

Spelling strategy:

Make a word memorable to make the spelling noticeable. Use for difficult words.



Writing Tasks (Aim to do 1 per day)

Talk for Writing – Home Booklet (Two-week project) What's a Rhi-swano-zeb-tah?

(A donation has been made to Great Ormond Street Hospital Children's Charity so that you can use this at home for free.)

- Compose an email to your teacher (using Y5@spaldingparish.lincs.sch.uk) to describe and explain the most important things you have learnt since being at home. How has it impacted the way you think? For example, you may have learnt the importance of being a good neighbour etc.
- Put yourselves in your Mum's or another family member's shoes. Write a poem about how they might be feeling with what is happening in the world currently?
- BBC Bitesize Writing a newspaper report
- Pick something that has happened this week (it can be anything, helping a neighbour, putting away your washing, remembering to wash your hair etc.) and write a newspaper report.

UKS2 Learning Project - to be worked on between Monday 4th May to Friday 15th May

The project this week aims to provide opportunities for you to learn more about different viewpoints. Learning may focus on physical viewpoints in terms of what you can see outside of the window at home, what others can see looking into your home and then progress onto personal viewpoints and those of others.

- Mrs Mulley's VE Day Challenge.
- ✓ **Viewpoints and Mood:** Look into a room in the home and think about how it makes you feel. You can then either draw something linked to how you feel when looking in the room or <u>draw an object</u> from the room and then colour, shade or paint it in a colour that reflects your current mood.
- Peterborough Views: Peterborough Cathedral, Lido and Longthorpe Tower are just some of the famous viewpoints within Peterborough. You can choose a Peterborough or other viewpoint and use Google Earth or Google Maps to create an accurate scaled map of the location of the landmark.







- Viewpoints from Around the World: You can research famous viewpoints from around the world (e.g. The Eiffel Tower). Draw what you think you would see from this viewpoint. After this, you can design and create a miniature scale of the landmarks that give these viewpoints. Evaluate your creations.
- A change in Viewpoints: How did Martin Luther King and Rosa Park's actions and views shape society today? Compare and contrast viewpoints from then and now on people's race, culture and religion. How has this improved society's attitudes towards those who are different to ourselves?
- **Debate:** Is good more powerful than evil? Is it worse to fail at something or never attempt it in the first place? Is it more important to be liked or respected? Choose a question to answer, write a speech and use real-life examples to justify your opinion.
