Learning Project – Environment

Age Range: Year 3

Maths Tasks (Aim to do 1 per day)

- <u>Times Table Rockstars</u> use your individual login to access this you could even challenge your teacher or friends by clicking on 'Rock Slam' in the Multiplayer area!
- Mathletics try and do a couple of activities a day. (Tasks about shape.)
- BBC Daily Maths Lessons.
- <u>▲ The Oak National Academy</u> a range of lessons are available.
- Play on <u>Hit the Button</u> focus on number bonds, halves, doubles and times tables.
- Get a piece of paper and ask your child to show everything they know about Shape. This could be pictures, diagrams, explanations, methods etc. They can be as creative as they want to be.
- Develop knowledge through MathsFrame.
- Design a wanted poster for a shape using its properties.



E.g. Wanted Ted the Triangle. Look out for his three straight sides and three corners.

He has three acute angles and no right angles.

- Guess the Shape: I See Maths.
- Shape, Position and Movement Games.
- BBC Maths game: Guardians: Defenders of Mathematica

Reading Tasks (Aim to do 1 per day)

- A Share a story together. This could be a chapter book where you read and discuss a chapter a day. Examples of questions that could be asked can be found here.
- Read <u>Journey to Mars</u> from the Oxford Owls website. What do you know about space travel? Have you ever been to a science museum? Look carefully at the challenge words on the inside of the front cover.
- Watch Newsround and discuss what is happening in the wider world.
- BBC Reading Lesson: <u>Charlie Changes into a chicken</u> by Sam Copeland.

Learning Project - to be worked on between Monday 8th June to Friday 19th June

The project this week aims to provide opportunities for you to learn more about the environment. Learning may focus on changes to different environments, the impact of humans on environments, climate change etc.

- Mrs Mulley's Recycling and Upcycling Challenge.
- Let's Wonder: What is the weather like around the world? Which countries are most likely to have a snowstorm, torrential rain, heatwaves etc? Find out about natural disasters such as forest fires, earthquakes, tsunamis, floods, tornados etc. How is climate change having an effect on the weather and natural disasters?



Let's Create: Using recycled materials design and make a recycling mascot to spread the word about the importance and need to recycle. Think about what it is going to look like? Which materials are they going to use? How are they going to join the materials together? Once completed, remember to evaluate their mascot. What would they do differently next time? Which parts did they find the most challenging and why?



Be Active: Get into the garden and practise throwing and catching skills and keeping control of ball-based equipment like bats and balls.

Time to Talk: Discuss environmental issues in the UK. Air pollution, climate change, litter, waste, and soil contamination are all examples of human activity that have an impact in the UK. What are the global environmental issues? Various processes that can be said to contribute to the global environmental problems include pollution, global warming, ozone depletion, acid rain, depletion of natural resources, overpopulation, waste disposal and deforestation. These processes have a highly negative impact on our environment. Decide as a family how you could 'do your bit' to look after your environment. E.g. You could set up a recycling station in your home; Paper, plastics and glass.



Understanding Others and Appreciating Differences: Throughout our lives, culture and experience shapes worldviews, children growing up in the Netherlands, for example, have a much different understanding of the role of water in their lives than their peers in the Sahara Desert. The difference between the abundance and scarcity of water in each of these physical environments affects every aspect of their respective cultures, including the global perceptions they will carry with them throughout their lives. Think about food. How do they think people view food in the UK compared to those living in Ethiopia for example? Research a country where food and water are scarce. Find out about charities that help people in need, Red cross, Christian Aid, Islamic Relief or other charities that are significant to them.
