


Dear Y5EW

We first met back on 5^{th} July 2019 when we spent Transition Day together and you told me all about yourselves.




What a lot has happened since then! We may not have had a full year together but we have had some good times and have made some good memories which I thought I would share with you.

November


What a busy month!

December




A sad moment too when Goda left our class to start a new journey at a different school.


January






February
