COVID 19 - SPCEDS Update

Firstly, I would just like to say a huge thank you to all of you for all your continued support throughout the last few months. As teachers and school staff it has been challenging for us all as we miss all the children and families so much. I do fully appreciate that it will not have been easy for any of you, juggling learning for a number of pupils, alongside running a home and also perhaps working from home, challenges faced by many of us too! We have had to adapt to new ways of working, supporting and working with different Year Groups. However all staff have risen to this challenge and I would also like to thank all of them for their continued support since March. Thank you all!

Last week saw us welcome some of our pupils back to school, namely our Year I and Year 6 pupils. It was fantastic to see them all and I have to say, despite the changed way of working and the restrictions in place, it was a very successful week. The pupils are all very settled in their bubbles and adapting well to their new routines. I would also like to say a huge thank you to all of them, and to their families, for their positivity during the last week. I am very proud of each and every one of you.

As I have shared previously staffing capacity does continue to present some challenges. However, we continue to review and adapt our plans for reopening. Today saw the opening of a further two 'bubbles', an additional Key Worker bubble for Key Worker pupils and a further bubble for Year 6 pupils. Whilst we have not yet been able to offer provision for FS2 we are hoping to be able to do so in the coming weeks and will keep you informed. Please be aware however, that as a result of staffing capacity, this may not be in their normal rooms or with their normal adults.
