Please note that government guidelines do not authorise any holidays during term time unless in **exceptional** circumstances **and** your child's attendance is already **exemplary**.

The following information is taken from Lincolnshire attendance quidance:

## Why is school attendance important for my child?

- ✓ Most parents want their children to be happy and achieve
- ✓ It is more important than ever for children to have a good education, to have choices and opportunities in adult life (a school year is only 190 days in total).
- ✓ Children only get one chance at school and your child's chances of a successful future may be affected if they are not attending school regularly
- Chances (probability) of achieving good grades based on your child's school attendance level:

Attendance/ No. of days of education	No. of days absence	Chance of achieving expected standard in SATs/GCSEs
190 to 186 days = 100%-98%	Up to 4 days	Expected attendance: very good chance
182 to 176 days = 96%-93%	Between 8 and 14 days	Risk of under achievement
170 days = 90%	20 days	Less than 50%*
161 days = 85%	29 days	Less than 20%

\*A 90% attendance means your child is absent from school for the equivalent of half a day per week, missing up to 3 hours of lessons a week!

## It's not cool to be late for school!

We would also like to take this opportunity to remind you that the school day begins at 8.45am for KS2 and 8.50am for FSI/KSI and that children can enter the classroom IO minutes prior to these times (8.35am KS2/8.40am FS2/KSI). Thank you to the majority of children who arrive to school on time and continue to show exceptional attendance. However, we are concerned that there are a number of families who are frequently late. If the children arrive after 9am, they are marked as unauthorised and persistent lateness may result in attendance support meetings with yourself and the school, in order to find ways to address this. It is a legal requirement that children are present for the start of the school day.

Being late for school does not set a good example to the children. We wouldn't expect a teacher to arrive late for the class or employees to be constantly late for work, so it is essential that we teach the children at an early age the importance of punctuality.

#### What difference does it make if my child arrives late to school?

Lateness = lost learning — minutes amount to days!

During registration, children are given early morning work each day to practise skills taught. Children can be very unsettled for the rest of the morning if they have had to begin class work or join assembly part way through.

Minutes lost each day	Days per school year
5 mins	3 days
10 mins	6.5 days
15 mins	10 days
20 mins	13 days
30 mins	19 days
