

Foundation Stage:

It has been a great week in FS2 with children en joying a range of different activities. We have started formal Phonics teaching and the children have learnt the following sounds so far: s, a, t, p. We have been busy using BBC Numberblocks to support our Maths teaching and the children are really en joying meeting each number. The episodes can be found online at home too through a Google search. We have been busy building dens and en joying outdoor learning too. This week we have been watching a toad jump around the garden, found worms to watch in the rain and have also watched a small snail! All of these have provided awe and wonder and social and speaking skills. We can't wait to see what next week brings!

Key Stage I:

This week we have been exploring our text 'Here We Are' by Oliver Jeffers. Oliver Jeffers also wrote books such as 'Lost and Found', 'How to Catch a Star' and 'The Way Back Home'. Why not share these books with your child. Are there any similarities between them?



In class, the children have been exploring a wide range of vocabulary and writing descriptive sentences using images to support. We have seen some amazing examples and have some fantastic authors.

Lower Key Stage 2:

This week in Year 3 we have been learning about a whole range of new things. Science in particular has been very exciting! To build our scientific skills when working scientifically, we explored how magnets are attracted to metal and then created our own mazes and tracks that the children needed to move a paperclip along. The children really enjoyed their investigations and it became very apparent that we have some very skilled scientists in Year 3! What a fantastic week.



Upper Key Stage 2:

The school is a buzz of community spirit and learning as we move through this term. Poetry has been a focus in English using our two focus books 'While we Can't Hug' and 'Here We Are': alliteration, metaphors, similes, rhythm and some fantastic description about their special places. Even though Roald Dahl Day was not the same this year, we still managed to celebrate it in style and spend some time inventing new words (BFG style), designing Dream Jars, writing 'good thought anti-Twit poems (to combat the terrible Mr and Mrs Twit) and we still found time to celebrate our own Reading Festival in our classrooms by listening to a range of extracts from his books. The children are making us proud everyday of this new school year. National Poetry Day took place on Thursday 2nd October and we had fun exploring, reading and writing poems: love letters to healthy snacks – thanks to poet Joshua Seigal!
