#### Welcome to Term 4

#### **Responding to Concerns**

Throughout the academic year relationships with pupils and ensuring they are happy and safe in school is always high on our agenda. The same is true regarding our communication with and relationships with parents and carers. We know that this is true for our parent/carer body and would like to thank parents and carers for their support over the academic year so far.

We do know there are sometimes worries or concerns around school. If you do have any worries, or if there is something you need to share as it may impact your child's day then please speak to your child's class teacher. Similarly members of the SLT are available on the site each morning and afternoon for parents/carers to speak to or emails can be sent to feedback@spaldingparish.laat.co.uk.

Whilst at times frustrations can run high please remember it is not appropriate for parents to be using abusive language towards or repeatedly challenging another parent, pupils in school or members of staff. This will not be tolerated either within or outside of the school community, particularly given the fact that the primary aim of all staff at SPCEDS is caring for and ensuring the safety of your child. Such incidents will be taken extremely seriously and may, in some instances, lead to a ban from the school site.

Thank you in anticipation of your continued support. I'm sure you will agree that only by working together can we ensure a safe, positive and happy environment for all our pupils.

#### **Illnesses and Absences**

A huge thank you to parents and carers for your support with improving attendance at Spalding Parish. Thank you to all of you who have only kept your children off school for the necessary time and not extended their absence any longer than needed. Being back with friends and back to usual routines often helps children get back to normal.

If your child has been prescribed medicine such as antibiotics, it doesn't mean they have to stay absent from school until the medicine is finished. Once your child starts to feel better, send them into school and, as long as you complete the necessary form at the office, we will be able to administer the medicine for you at the time your child needs to take it.

As well as thanking you for your support in making sure your child attends school when fit and well, we recognise that children can suffer from minor ailments such as a headache or a slight cold and yet are still fully able to attend school. We do realise that any child can suddenly fall ill and be unable to attend school but we would recommend that, if you are not sure if they are well enough to attend, bring them in to see how they get on; we will certainly call you should they need to go home.

Absence from school has a serious impact on children's attainment and progress as they miss vital chunks of essential teaching and learning in a carefully planned curriculum. Having seen lots of children missing from school over the last couple of weeks, we really hope that the recent illnesses soon disappear so that the children's learning isn't affected any further.

#### **School Support**

Just an update regarding the support Emily Hill and I are offering to a local Church school. From a school perspective I would just like to reassure parents/carers that daily life at Spalding Parish and for your child will not be affected. Our strong leadership team, supported by our effective staff team will continue to drive our school forward, clearly focused on our school vision and ethos of ensuring all are able to flourish.

As educators, Emily and I are committed to ensuring all have the opportunity to reach their potential. This is the case within both our school community and across the Trust. As such we are extremely positive about this opportunity to support another local school, whilst also recognising the benefits this may offer our school community. We will both continue to be in school for a significant period each week and look forward to working with you as always.

The current plan is that the days will vary week to week to ensure that we are at Spalding Parish for key times and events whilst also being able to offer the same support for the other school. I will endeavour to confirm this with you on a regular basis via the Parish Post but obviously this may be subject to change, depending on what is happening in school.

#### **Head Lice**

We are still seeing an increase in the number of cases of head lice in school and therefore would just ask the following from all families please.

- Please check your child's hair asap and treat if lice are found.
- Conditioner and combing is the most effective methods. Please ensure you use a proper
  detection comb with teeth no more than 0.3mm apart as this works best to trap head lice.
  The comb is usually white in colour so that lice can be easily identified.
- Please also ensure that long hair is tied up.

#### **PE Kit**

Just a quick reminder re PE kit. In line with our school policy children are not able to wear earrings for PE, please support your child, if relevant, in removing their earrings for PE days.

As you will know we are also still allowing children to come to school on PE days in their PE kit as we do recognise the benefits to this. However we are again seeing an increase in incorrect uniform. Please ensure that children are only wearing plain navy or black sweatshirt or their school purple jumper and their school T-shirt. Jazzy tracksuits or bright colours are not school uniform and should not be worn. We know the children enjoy coming to school in their PE kit however it is also important that the children are wearing appropriate kit or this may need to be reviewed. Thank you.

#### **Attendance Update**

A huge thank you must go to parents and carers and also the pupils themselves for your efforts re school attendance this term and for also ensuring children are in school on time. It is an area that remains high priority at Spalding Parish and one that we continue to work on given the direct link between good attendance and high achievement.

Recently released Government guidance classifies attendance using five categories: Good Attendance, At Risk of Persistent Absence, Persistent Absence, At Risk of Severe Absence, Severe Absence with percentage bands for each as follows.

**Good Attendance:** >95.00%

At Risk of Persistent Absence: 90.00% - 94.99%

**Persistent Absence:** 70.00% - 89.99%

At Risk of Severe Absence: 50.00% - 69.99%

Severe Absence: <50.00%

During the week beginning 20th February attendance at Spalding Parish was as follows in terms of pupil numbers and percentages with an overall percentage of 96.3% for the week.

Good Attendance: 487 pupils (out of 554), 87.9% pupils

At Risk of Persistent Absence: 10 pupils (out of 554), 1.8% pupils

Persistent Absence: 29 pupils (out of 554), 5.2% of pupils

At Risk of Severe Absence: 18 pupils (out of 554), 3.2% pupils

Severe Absence: 10 pupils (out of 554), 1.8% pupils

During the week beginning 27th February attendance at Spalding Parish was as follows in terms of pupil numbers and percentages with an overall percentage of 95.8% for the week.

Good Attendance: 481 pupils (out of 554), 86.8% pupils

At Risk of Persistent Absence: 12 pupils (out of 554), 2.2% pupils

Persistent Absence: 31 pupils (out of 554), 5.6% of pupils

At Risk of Severe Absence: 20 pupils (out of 554), 3.6% pupils

Severe Absence: 10 pupils (out of 554), 1.8% pupils

This means that the attendance of 12% of pupils during the week beginning 20th February and 13% of pupils during the week beginning 27th February was considered to be a concern. Whilst we appreciate that children cannot help being ill and neither would we want them in school ill, attendance at school is high priority and as such we need to be doing all we can to ensure pupils are attending school as much as possible. A table showing the potential impact of absence from school is below.

Your child's education is our primary focus and given the extensive research proving a direct link between good attendance and good outcomes, alongside the national attendance guidance for schools, we do follow all absences up. This is not about singling anybody out but simply carrying out our statutory duty as a school and as such I would ask for your support in communicating with us in a positive way. We aim to work closely with parents and carers to support with improving attendance where this is causing concern and potentially impacting achievement. Thank you in anticipation of your continued support.



Please remember if your child is unwell and unable to attend school, you should inform school by 9.30am that day in line with our school procedures. Please contact school on each day of absence unless otherwise agreed.

Also please remember that routine dental and medical appointments should not be made during school time. It is preferable and much more beneficial for pupils if appointments can be made either at the end of the school day or during school holidays. If you do have to make an appointment for during the school day, and we do appreciate that there are times when this may be necessary, please bring the appointment letter to the school office. Without this letter the absence will not be authorised.


We are also seeing an increase in leave of absence requests. Current Government regulations mean that absence from school can only be authorised for "exceptional circumstances" for which

there is very clear established criteria, again set by the Government. It is therefore highly unlikely that time off school will be authorised during term time.

Requests for term time absence, for any reason, must be made at least 10 days before the absence, except in emergencies, by booking an appointment with a member of the Senior Leadership Team.

Should an appointment not be made, and in line with our safeguarding procedures and Government regulations, we will contact you with regards to your child's absence in order to clarify fully the reasons for absence. Should the absence be unauthorised this may lead to a Fixed Penalty Notice being issued. This may also be the case with regards to the increasing absences that we are seeing at the beginning and end of terms.

#### Curriculum Corner




A change from the curriculum this week to update you around some of the things we have been undertaking in school with the children. As part of our whole school Collective Worship on a Monday we have been considering values, including the British values, and how this helps us all to live a good life. This has also allowed us to review our overarching school rules of Ready, Respectful, Safe and looking at what that means to each of us. The children had some brilliant ideas of how they could follow these rules throughout the school day and it has been brilliant to see this in action, in the classroom, on the playground and also through other areas in school.

Year groups have also started to sit together with the older pupils supporting the younger pupils and feedback from the children has been really positive. We look forward to seeing how this evolves in the coming weeks.

# **General Updates**



## **COVID-19 Guidance**

The current COVID guidance remains very much the same at this point in time. If you do have any questions around this please do not hesitate to get in touch.

From 1st April 2022 the guidance around COVID and testing has been amended, as was previously outlined on the COVID road map and our transition into 'Living with COVID'.

Covid is now specifically referenced in the guidance around the control of infectious diseases and there is no separate COVID guidance. Section 3 is related to management of infectious diseases, COVID being detailed within the section about Respiratory Infections. Section 4 of this guidance references actions to be taken should there be an 'outbreak'. For ease, the link to the document is below with the guidance being as follows.

Essentially – COVID will be treated as we would any other infectious illness. Staff and children will be encouraged to stay at home if they are unwell. Where there is a positive COVID test, the timescales as below are advised:

• 5 days for staff and 3 days for pupils.

Further to the above, children/staff with a temperature, should not return to school/work whilst they still have a temperature, but can return with mild cold symptoms and if they are otherwise well enough to be at school/work.

#### Start and End of Day Routines - Reminder

Thank you for your support in ensuring pupils are at school on time, it is very much appreciated and does ensure pupils are ready for the start of the day. There does seem to have been some confusion around timings for the beginning and end of day which are as follows:

FS2: Start of Day 8.50am (doors open from 8.40am) End of Day 3.10pm

KS1 (Year 1 - 2): Start of Day 8.50am (doors open from 8.40am) End of Day 3.10pm

KS2 (Year 3 - 6): Start of Day 8.45am (doors open from 8.35am) End of Day 3.20pm

In a morning the gates will open at 8.30am on a morning to allow time to get onto site ready for doors opening at 8.35am (KS2) and close at 8.55am.

Similarly, on an afternoon, the gates at the end of the day will open at 3.05pm ready for end of day at 3.10pm (KS1) and close at 3.30pm.

These timings do need to be adhered to at the beginning and end of day to ensure our safeguarding requirements are met so we would appreciate your support with this. If you do have any concerns, please speak to a member of the Senior Leadership Team.

When on the site please be courteous and stand away from the classroom windows and doors as pupils will still be learning until the end of the school day.

If we could also please ask that school equipment, including the gym equipment on the playgrounds, is not used at the beginning or end of the day. We appreciate that this is very tempting but use needs to be supervised by school adults so if you could please ensure your children do not use. This will ensure that pupils and families are able to stay safe.


Hello,





#### **Key Stage 1**

# Year 2

In Science we have been looking at what plants need to grow and survive and so far we have found out that we they need water, time, air, the right temperature and sunlight. To explore this further we have set up a small experiment, currently watching a bean grow. The children have been filling in our plant diaries twice a week to record the growth of the bean, including notes and drawing pictures. Later in the term we will be setting up another experiment where we will place 5 plants in different areas to see if these conditions are accurate, finding out what will happen to the plants if they don't receive these elements.

In Computing we have been looking at pictograms using an online website called J2E Data where the children have been creating their own picograms. We have been looking at questions such as 'what

This week in Lower Key Stage 2 our focus is on Year 3 and Year 4 and their learning over the last few weeks.


## Year 3

The children began their learning by exploring trays of flotsam (items washed ashore by the sea) and discussing what they could be and writing descriptive sentences about them. The book has truly captivated the children and they have loved being immersed in lots of rich vocabulary. We are working towards writing our own retellings of the story and can't wait to share each others in our class Book Nooks.

In Computing we have continued to develop our knowledge of Branching Databases. We are getting really good at creating questions which help to sort data and objects by their attributes. 
#### Year 6

What another busy week Year 6 have had. As well as fitting in a week of assessments, we have been busy in other areas of the curriculum too. On Tuesday, Year 6 supported Open the Book with their version of the story of Gideon in the Bible.

In English, we have used our letter writing and publishing skills to write thank you letters to all of the companies and people who came to support our World of Work Day on Monday 6th February. We enjoyed writing them and sharing our favourite part of the sessions. Some of use are now hoping to use some of the skills we learnt about to apply for the position of a Table Monitor in the hall at lunch time.

Having finished our work on ratio, Year 6 have now moved on to learning about Algebra. First of all we looked at expressions, moving on to substitution, finishing the week with formula. We enjoyed using expression and substitution, but found formula at little more tricky.
