General Updates



COVID Update

From 1st April 2022 the guidance around COVID and testing has been amended, as was previously outlined on the COVID road map and our transition into 'Living with COVID'.

Covid is now specifically referenced in the guidance around the control of infectious diseases and there is no separate COVID guidance. Section 3 is related to management of infectious diseases, COVID being detailed within the section about Respiratory Infections. Section 4 of this guidance references actions to be taken should there be an 'outbreak'.

Essentially – COVID will be treated as we would any other infectious illness. Staff and children will be encouraged to stay at home if they are unwell. Where there is a positive COVID test, the timescales as below are advised:

- 5 days for staff and
- 3 days or pupils.

Further to the above, children/staff with a temperature, should not return to work/school whilst they still have a temperature, but can return with mild cold symptoms and if they are otherwise well enough to be at work/school.

As we move into this phase we do still need to be cautious as we are aware that the number of COVID cases were increasing prior to the Easter Break.

There is no longer a legal requirement for us to specifically reference COVID control measures in risk assessment but as above, we are still strongly encouraging good ventilation, encouraging and enabling vaccination, frequent hand washing and robust cleaning routines etc. These are important measures to stop the spread of any potentially infectious disease.

We will review this stance into the new term and considering the latest guidance around reducing the spread of respiratory infections in the workplace. The NHS has updated new symptoms of COVID as below:

- a high temperature or shivering (chills) a high temperature means you feel hot to touch on your chest or back (you do not need to measure your temperature)
- a new, continuous cough this means coughing a lot for more than an hour, or 3 or more coughing episodes in 24 hours
- a loss or change to your sense of smell or taste
- shortness of breath
- feeling tired or exhausted
- an aching body
- a headache
- a sore throat
- a blocked or runny nose
- loss of appetite
- diarrhoea
- feeling sick or being sick


Start and End of Day Routines

With the removal of restrictions and the introduction of new guidance our start and end of the day routines have now returned to pre-COVID timings.

Therefore from Wednesday 20th April the start and finish times for pupils will be as follows:

FS2: Start of Day 8.50am (doors open from 8.40am) End of Day 3.10pm

KS1: Start of Day 8.50am (doors open from 8.40am)



KS2: Start of Day 8.45am (doors open from 8.35am)

The gates will open at 8.30am on a morning to allow time to get onto site ready for doors opening at 8.35am (KS2) and close at 8.55am. Similarly the gates at the end of the day will open at 3.05pm ready for end of day at 3.10pm (KS1) and close at 3.30pm. If you do come onto the site early to collect your child please be courteous and stand away from the classroom windows and doors as pupils will still be learning until the end of the school day. Your support with this would be very much appreciated.

If we could also please ask that school equipment, including the gym equipment on the playgrounds, is not used at the beginning or end of the day. We appreciate that this is very tempting but use needs to be supervised by school adults so if you could please ensure your children do not use. This will ensure that pupils and families are able to stay safe.



Safeguarding

Safeguarding is an important part of our work with children and young adults so we will keep this reminder in each edition of the Parish Post. Safeguarding is the responsibility of all of us. If you have concerns about the safety of any child, please let somebody know. Diane Mulley and Emily Hill are the designated safeguarding officers within the school. Similarly if you do require any support, please do not hesitate to get in touch.

SPCEDS Site

As you will know the school site is both a dog free site and also a non-smoking site - this also includes e-cigarettes. This is to ensure the health and safety of all whilst accessing the school site. If we could please ask that when accessing the school site, either to bring your child to school or to collect, that there is no smoking on site and that no dogs are brought on site.

A week in focus for Year 3 this week.


Year 3

On our return to school we have been working hard to record and share our knowledge and understanding of rivers and their journeys. The children have produced some fantastic work.






Upper Key Stage 2

Year 5's learning is the focus of the Parish Post this week.

Year 5

Year 5 have really enjoyed their English focus on the book 'The Man who walked between the Towers' by Mordicai Gerstein. At the start of the book, they enjoyed taking part in drama during their gymnastic lesson and putting themselves into Philippe's shoes.

After completing their newspaper reports, they focused on discussion texts by exploring whether Philippe Petit's punishment was fair or not. The children put forward some fantastic points for both sides and developed a range of language features to present their writing in a very sophisticated way. Within the class discussions, all the children listened well and developed their Oracy skills by building on each point and then instigating some great counter points.



They have also become experts in their geographical study of Europe. Focusing on the question 'What makes Europe Wonderful?', they have been able to find links and variations in history, culture, diversity and really focus on physical and human features.

They have explored places in Europe they are linked to by family and friends, Spalding's Twin Town Speyer, locations in Italy and used all of this knowledge to persuade tourists to visit Europe.

For International Mother Language Day, they made eBooks with a focus on a country of their choice in Europe. Using Google Translate, they presented their books in dual language.

Year 5 have really enjoyed building on their prior knowledge of rivers, mountains and volcanoes to focus these just to Europe. Their last lesson focused on migration and the movement of people from the very first in history to today. Well done, Year 5!
