

# **Parking**

Car Parking Please remember to park courteously for the safety of all our community whilst respecting our neighbours. Please park legally allowing the safe use of the road and pavements for all. Do not park on the public footpath as it makes it dangerous with the numbers of people using them.

If you are just dropping your child off, please park up and ensure their safe exit from the vehicle on to the pavement so they can then walk safely into school. The closer to school you get the more congested it is so if you are able to park further away, or even walk all the way to and from school, this would be appreciated.



# **Attendance Update**

A huge thank you must go to parents and carers and also the pupils themselves for your efforts re school attendance this term and for also ensuring children are in school on time. It is an area that remains high priority at Spalding Parish and one that we continue to work on given the direct link between good attendance and high achievement.

Recently released Government guidance classifies attendance using five categories: Good Attendance, At Risk of Persistent Absence, Persistent Absence, At Risk of Severe Absence, Severe Absence with percentage bands for each as follows.

**Good Attendance:** >95.00%

At Risk of Persistent Absence: 90.00% - 94.99%

**Persistent Absence:** 70.00% - 89.99%

At Risk of Severe Absence: 50.00% - 69.99%

Severe Absence: <50.00%

During the week beginning 9th January (our first full week at school this term) attendance at Spalding Parish was as follows in terms of pupil numbers and percentages with an overall percentage of 96.55% for the week.

Good Attendance: 495 pupils (out of 551), 89.8% pupils

At Risk of Persistent Absence: 12 pupils (out of 551), 2.2% pupils


Persistent Absence: 18 pupils (out of 551), 3.3% of pupils

At Risk of Severe Absence: 16 pupils (out of 551), 2.9% pupils

Severe Absence: 10 pupils (out of 551), 1.8% pupils

This means that the attendance of 10% of pupils was considered to be a concern during last week which is a significant improvement on previous weeks. Whilst we appreciate that children cannot help being ill and neither would we want them in school ill, attendance at school is high priority and as such we need to be doing all we can to ensure pupils are attending school as much as possible. A table showing the potential impact of absence from school is below.

Your child's education is our primary focus and given the extensive research proving a direct link between good attendance and good outcomes, alongside the national attendance guidance for schools, we do follow all absences up. This is not about singling anybody out but simply carrying out our statutory duty as a school and as such I would ask for your support in communicating with us in a positive way. We aim to work closely with parents and carers to support with improving attendance where this is causing concern and potentially impacting achievement. Thank you in anticipation of your continued support.



Please remember if your child is unwell and unable to attend school, you should inform school by 9.30am that day in line with our school procedures. Please contact school on each day of absence unless otherwise agreed.


Also please remember that routine dental and medical appointments should not be made during school time. It is preferable and much more beneficial for pupils if appointments can be made either at the end of the school day or during school holidays. If you do have to make an appointment for during the school day, and we do appreciate that there are times when this may be necessary, please bring the appointment letter to the school office. Without this letter the absence will not be authorised.

We are also seeing an increase in leave of absence requests. Current Government regulations mean that absence from school can only be authorised for "exceptional circumstances" for which there is very clear established criteria, again set by the Government. It is therefore highly unlikely that time off school will be authorised during term time.

Requests for term time absence, for any reason, must be made at least 10 days before the absence, except in emergencies, by booking an appointment with a member of the Senior Leadership Team.

Should an appointment not be made, and in line with our safeguarding procedures and Government regulations, we will contact you with regards to your child's absence in order to clarify fully the reasons for absence. Should the absence be unauthorised this may lead to a Fixed Penalty Notice being issued. This may also be the case with regards to the increasing absences that we are seeing at the beginning and end of terms.

# Curriculum Corner



It has been a very busy couple of weeks back at Spalding Parish and it has been amazing to see just how settled the children have been since their return to school. Over the course of this period I have been fortunate to visit classrooms and be part of the children's learning and it is fair to say that there has been lots going on.

Within Foundation Stage and Year 1 there continues to be a clear focus on Phonics, supporting the children as they develop both their phonic knowledge and their reading skills. Across Key Stage 1 the focus for Writing is very much on Writing for a Purpose. In Year 1 the children have started to think about Paddington Bear as a stimulus for their writing, developing fact files for Paddington utilising all that they have learnt and know about him. Within Year 2, the children have had a real focus on descriptive language and linking this to their senses in term of what they can see, hear, touch, smell and taste. The children has used photos of different places in the world as a stimulus

and described them using their senses. There really were some fantastic ideas for vocabulary and I look forward to the pupils using this newly acquired knowledge in their future writing.



# **General Updates**



# **COVID-19 Guidance**

The current COVID guidance remains very much the same at this point in time. If you do have any questions around this please do not hesitate to get in touch.

From 1st April 2022 the guidance around COVID and testing has been amended, as was previously outlined on the COVID road map and our transition into 'Living with COVID'.

Covid is now specifically referenced in the guidance around the control of infectious diseases and there is no separate COVID guidance. Section 3 is related to management of infectious diseases, COVID being detailed within the section about Respiratory Infections. Section 4 of this guidance references actions to be taken should there be an 'outbreak'. For ease, the link to the document is below with the guidance being as follows.

Essentially – COVID will be treated as we would any other infectious illness. Staff and children will be encouraged to stay at home if they are unwell. Where there is a positive COVID test, the timescales as below are advised:

• 5 days for staff and 3 days for pupils.

Further to the above, children/staff with a temperature, should not return to school/work whilst they still have a temperature, but can return with mild cold symptoms and if they are otherwise well enough to be at school/work.

# Start and End of Day Routines - Reminder

Thank you for your support in ensuring pupils are at school on time, it is very much appreciated and does ensure pupils are ready for the start of the day. There does seem to have been some confusion around timings for the beginning and end of day which are as follows:

FS2: Start of Day 8.50am (doors open from 8.40am) End of Day 3.10pm

KS1 (Year 1 - 2): Start of Day 8.50am (doors open from 8.40am) End of Day 3.10pm

KS2 (Year 3 - 6): Start of Day 8.45am (doors open from 8.35am) End of Day 3.20pm


In a morning the gates will open at 8.30am on a morning to allow time to get onto site ready for doors opening at 8.35am (KS2) and close at 8.55am.

Similarly, on an afternoon, the gates at the end of the day will open at 3.05pm ready for end of day at 3.10pm (KS1) and close at 3.30pm.

These timings do need to be adhered to at the beginning and end of day to ensure our safeguarding requirements are met so we would appreciate your support with this. If you do have any concerns, please speak to a member of the Senior Leadership Team.

When on the site please be courteous and stand away from the classroom windows and doors as pupils will still be learning until the end of the school day.

If we could also please ask that school equipment, including the gym equipment on the playgrounds, is not used at the beginning or end of the day. We appreciate that this is very tempting but use needs to be supervised by school adults so if you could please ensure your children do not use. This will ensure that pupils and families are able to stay safe.



# Safeguarding

Safeguarding is an important part of our work with children and young adults so we will keep this reminder in each edition of the Parish Post. Safeguarding is the responsibility of all of us.



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# Key Stage 1

A visit to Year 1 this week to hear all about their learning over the last fortnight.

# Year 1

Year One have had a fantastic start to 2023. We found a suitcase, some wellies and a marmalade sandwich left in our classrooms, which led us to believe Paddington Bear had visited. We read his story and created some fact files about him from what we read. We are now writing some instructions for him on how to make his favourite food, marmalade sandwiches!

In Science this term we are learning about plants. We have learned the names of some common plants and have some great ideas already about the parts of a plant.

In History we are learning about The Great Fire of London. We have looked at maps of London from the Roman times until the present day and have seen how the city has changed over time. We have thought about how people know about what happened, as it was beyond living memory. We have looked at Samual Pepys diary to find out what happened.

In RE this term we are learning about the Islam faith. Did you know Muslims have 99 names for Allah? We are learning lots of new vocabulary, so do ask us what we have learned.

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This week in Lower Key Stage 2 our focus is on Year 3 and Year 4 and their learning over the last few weeks.

# Year 3

Year 3 have returned to school full of enthusiasm for learning! This term we are looking at multiplication and division in Maths and have been using the "Build it, draw it, write it" approach. Ask us what this means!

In English we have started learning how to write a persuasive letter and are using "The day the crayons quit" as our inspiration. We have had lively discussions about when we might try to persuade someone to do something and what language we would use.

In French we have just started learning about "Les Instruments" and we will be learning about - and understanding - Hinduism in RE lessons. The focus for History this term is The Romans in Britain: we were amazed at how long ago they invaded and full of ideas about why they might have done so. We've also learned about Roman soldiers and why they were a formidable fighting force. We are also reading a non-fiction text about Pompeii which has given us more information about how the Romans lived and worked. We are looking forward to finding out more!


### Year 4

We have had a great week in Year 4 – in Maths we are continuing our learning with multiplication and division. This week we have been looking at multiplying and dividing by 10 and 100.

In Science, we have begun our topic on looking at electrical circuits and how they work. We had a fun lesson building our own simple circuits!

In English we are looking at persuasive writing and are currently working on producing adverts to encourage people to donate to the Agape Care Food Bank, we are excited to help make a difference as well as grow as learners.

This term we will also be starting our topic in History on Early Civilisations. We will be focusing on and comparing Ancient Sumar, the Indus Valley and the Shang Dynasty – we are excited to learn about interesting inventions and how our past influences us today!



# **Upper Key Stage 2**

Year 6 and their learning over the last couple of weeks is the focus of the Parish Post this week.

# Year 6

In Year 6, we have started the new year as we mean to go on! Embracing our Learning Powers and being 'Ready, Respectful and Safe'.

In groups, in DT, we planned and designed moving carousels. During the first three days back, we worked to build electrical circuits with motors, switches and cells to create a mechanism that made our carousels move. Using recycled materials, we created our carousel design, which were amazing! Children from Year 2 and Year 3, and Mr Robinson, popped to see our products and support our evaluations.

'Unique!'

| 'Colourful!'  We were all able to make some useful next steps to support our work in the future.  In Maths, we have been enjoying our learning through using manipulatives to multiple and divide fractions. Starting with apples at the start of the week and then sweets to find fractions of amounts.  We have been great learning partners, checking in and supporting each other with top tips if needed and explaining the steps we have been able to take. We have developed our reasoning in Maths by using our Oracy skills to find the 'odd one out' in a list of fraction division calculations and 'can we use the same method?'  In Reading, we have used a very challenging extract of text from 'Mountains of the Mind' to explore our first impressions of Polar Explorers. We are experts at using strategies to understand new vocabulary, use it context and share our views on a text during our oracy sessions. We have debated statements such as 'Polar Explorers were cowards' by using the text to back up our views. Then we have developed an outstanding list of impressions of our own from 'bold', 'risk-takers', adventurers', 'nature lovers', 'aristocratic' to 'fastidious'.  Watch this space to find out about our learning in History: How civilised was Viking Yorvik and Baghdad in 900AD? |
