Start of Term 5 Newsletter

As we head into the final two terms of the academic year it is clear the year is certainly flying by. I hope you have all enjoyed the Easter break, an important time in the Christian calendar, and were able to take the opportunity to spend some quality time with your families.

Thank you to all who attended the recent Parent Consultation Evenings, I hope you found them both informative and useful. Please do complete the return slip, if you have not already done so, at the end of your child's report, all feedback is welcomed to ensure we can further develop our partnership. Through my monitoring of Teaching and Learning and having read all the children's reports, in the 10 days running up to the Parent Consultation Evenings, it is clear that all of our children have been working really hard. This is also evident in the progress within all Year Groups. I hope this continues as we return to school.

Coronation of King Charles III

It seems no time at all since we were celebrating the Platinum Jubilee of Queen Elizabeth II with our events in school taking place during Term 5 last academic year. Following the very sad passing of Queen Elizabeth II last September you will be aware that the Coronation of King Charles III is planned for the weekend of the 6th to the 8th May (with the 8th May deemed an additional Bank Holiday for this academic year).

As a school we think it only right to mark such an historic occasion within school, as we did with the Jubilee, and as such plans are afoot for a celebration within school on Friday 5th May. Further details with regards to this will follow once we have finalised our plans but we look forward to acknowledging and celebrating such an important period in the history of the country within school.

E-Safety

Our work around e-Safety and particularly social media continued during Terms 3 and 4, following our whole school support of Internet Safety Day. May I also take this opportunity to remind everyone that, as a school, we continue to work hard to teach the children how to use social media both responsibly and respectfully. Your support in demonstrating this to your child is greatly appreciated. Should you have any concerns please do not hesitate to come in to school to discuss them.

Recently, within Lincolnshire, there has been an increase in children accessing inappropriate content online and as such we have been asked to share the following guidance from the Community Safety Service.

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Inappropriate Content Online Advice for Parents from Community Safety Service

Over the last few months, we have seen an increase in the number of schools reporting that students, while at home, have accessed content which is not always appropriate, some of which has been quite scary or upsetting. We have also had a report of worrying trends on TikTok encouraging nudity from its users. This can have legal implications for our children and young people that they often aren't aware of.

While there is no perfect way to eliminate this risk, we feel that there are things parents and carers can do to support their children online, reduce the risk or manage it after the fact. Remember to keep lines of Communication open with your children and young people. Just like we ask them how their day was at school and what they got up to it is equally important to have this conversation about their Online lives. If you can keep technology out of the bedrooms and private spaces this is also an effective tool in safeguarding our children.

Here are some more practical steps parents and carers can follow:

- Contact their Internet Service Provider (ISP): Companies that provide broadband such as BT, Sky and Virgin, offer free protection for parents and carers. They can filter your internet connection directly, without having to install anything. - YouTube is a fantastic resource, but not all the content is appropriate for children and not all YouTube channels are made for young audiences. YouTube has an app just for children – YouTube Kids – but many people don't realise that the main YouTube app has a restricted mode. - Games are also rated based on the content; not how difficult they are. 18 rated games can have very graphic violence, adult language and themes, sexual content, and horror elements. Have you heard about Tik Tok Family Pairing <u>https://newsroom.tiktok.com/en-us/tiktok-introduces-family-pairing</u> Family pairing allows adults to link their accounts to their teenagers account so you can customise their safety settings such as content, privacy and well being settings.

It's important to remember that no filters or controls are 100% effective so make sure your child knows that they can, and should, talk to someone if they see or hear anything upsetting online so we can offer them some reassurance. As you will know, as a school, we are part of the Lincoln Anglican Academy Trust family of schools. This year marks their 10th year as an Academy Trust and as such a number of celebrations are planned for Terms 5 and 6, including a whole Trust live service of celebration for the 20 Trust schools and also a 10 mile sponsored walk over 10 days. Parish Post

We are currently in the process of reviewing and updating the Parish Post so we can ensure parents and carers are receiving the most relevant information about school. Parking

Please remember to park courteously for the safety of all our community whilst respecting our neighbours. Please park legally allowing the safe use of the road and pavements for all. Do not park on the public footpath as it makes it dangerous with the numbers of people using them.

If you are just dropping your child off, please park up and ensure their safe exit from the vehicle on to the pavement so they can then walk safely into school. The closer to school you get the more congested it is so if you are able to park further away or even walk all the way to and from school this would be appreciated, particularly given the promise of improved weather ahead.

We continue to receive a small number of complaints from local neighbours where driveways are being blocked as a result of parking. We are all a community and it is important that we work together for the benefit of all. If you could please bear our neighbours in mind when parking, this would be very much appreciated.

Sun Safety

As the Easter holidays have seen the arrival of a little sunshine and warmer weather, could we please ask that you send your child into school prepared for the weather. If you could please ensure your child has a hat to keep the sun off their head during the times of the day when they are outside and a drinks bottle in school each day filled with fresh water to ensure your child stays hydrated in the warmer weather.
