SATs Timetable (Revised due to the Coronation)

Tuesday 9 th May	Grammar, Punctuation and Spelling (45 minutes + Spelling Test)
Wednesday 10 th May	Reading Comprehension (1 hour)
Thursday 11 th May	Maths Paper 1: Arithmetic test. (30 minutes) Maths Paper 2: Reasoning. (40 Minutes)
Friday 12 th May	Maths Paper 3: Reasoning (40 minutes)

What are the SATs?

The SATs are Standard Assessment Tests, which are used to test children's knowledge and understanding of the work they have completed in Years 3, 4, 5 and 6. All Year 6 children in England do the tests during the same week in May. The tests will provide information about how your child is progressing, compared to children the same age nationally.

Two subjects are tested as part of the statutory tests: English and Mathematics, although some elements are purely assessed through Teacher Assessment or through internal marking.

When the tests are complete, the externally marked papers will be sent away to be marked. Where in previous years, the scores were used to give a level for each subject; there will be a completely new marking scheme to replace the existing national curriculum levels.

The teachers will also give assessments based on school work.

Information

The format and content of the Key Stage 2 tests changed in 2016. This was to ensure that the tests are matched the new National Curriculum which has been taught in Primary Schools since September 2014.

The main changes to the tests were:

- The inclusion of questions to assess new areas of core subjects in the National Curriculum your child has been taught.
- A new arithmetic test to check your child is progressing with the fundamentals of Mathematics.

Normally they would run from Monday to Thursday but due to the Coronation they will run from Tuesday to Friday. We have already run a set up like this with the children and they were brilliant.

Working Together at Home

As a team, we have been so impressed with all the children in Year 6. For them to get the best experience of the SATS, a key measure in Secondary Schools initial assessments, children need to continue to:

- 🏠 Listen carefully in lessons;
- 🏠 Work hard and do their best at all times;
- 🏠 Keep active and fit;
- 🏠 Complete all their homework;
- 🏠 Practise their handwriting and presentation;
- 🏠 Do some form of reading every day to practise comprehension;
- 🏠 Revisit spellings/spelling rules to avoid mistakes in key spellings;
- 🏠 Learn and practise multiplication and division tables;
- 🏠 Talk to the relevant Teacher if they do not understand something;
- 🏠 Remember it is about showing what they know/what they can do;
- 🏠 Look through notes from school in relation to test subjects to learn key information.

Being Prepared

During SATs week and the weekend before children need to:

- 🏠 Get plenty of sleep;
- 🏠 Eat food that helps them concentrate and stay calm;
- 🏠 Have a good 'brain-food' breakfast on SATs days;
- 🏠 Drink lots of water;
- 🏠 Read through Maths Meander and GPS books;
- 🏠 Avoid stress;
- 🏠 Stay safe;
- 🏠 Be in school each day – if they are absent they can sit the tests on their return but attending school each day would be preferable;
- 🏠 Be prompt for the start of school – a late start may mean sitting the test in a room they are not used to as once tests are started they cannot be interrupted.

Frequently Asked Questions

What equipment will my child need?

No special equipment is required. Your child will be provided with all the equipment that they will need for the tests.

What if my child is ill?

Children who are ill are able to take the test on a different day within SATs week. This is revised statutory guidance for test administration. Please contact the school if there is a problem.

What if my child is worried about the exams?





Good preparation helps children feel confident. The important thing is that your child has a positive attitude and does their best.

Will children with special needs be supported?



In some cases, children with special needs may be allowed extra time to complete tests or have help with reading during certain tests.

An Overview of the SATs

English is separated into different aspects as follows:

-  Speaking and Listening (Teacher Assessment only)
-  Reading Comprehension
-  Writing (Teacher Assessment only)
-  Grammar, Punctuation and Spelling

Maths is tested by 3 papers:

-  Paper 1 tests arithmetic skills and the ability to apply knowledge at speed.
-  Papers 2 and 3 test the various areas of Maths; number, properties of number, shape, space and measures, and data handling alongside the children's ability to use and apply Maths in different contexts.

The Year 6 team would like to take this opportunity to thank you for your continued support. We hope you have found this information useful. Your child is our primary concern during their time in school and we hope their time in school is a happy one.
