Let's Celebrate - Year 5:

Well what a fabulous start to the year for our pupils new to Upper Key Stage 2. Year 5 have returned to school in their new classes, and everyone has settled in really well and are working really hard. We look forward to being able to share our early successes at our upcoming parent consultations and look forward to seeing you then.

We have been very busy in Maths, manipulating our counters to help us develop our understanding of Place Value. Using 'Matilda', by Roald Dahl, as our stimulus we have written letters to Miss Bird about ourselves showcasing what amazing English writing skills we have. Science has seen us start to learn about the human life cycle; in History we have re-enacted the Battle of Hastings and are delving deep into the new RE curriculum focusing on Creativity and World Views.

We are looking forward to what the rest of the term has to offer us and look forward to sharing this with you over the term ahead. To support our learning we would ask that you support your child to complete the weekly home learning tasks, returning it by the deadline. Thank you, as always, for you continued support!

Curriculum Focus - Maths

As we begin the new academic year, our Maths curriculum launches with a strong emphasis on Number and Place Value across all year groups. This foundational area of mathematics underpins pupils' understanding of the number system and supports their ability to reason and solve problems with confidence. From exploring numbers to 10 in EYFS to developing fluency with numbers up to 1,000,000 in upper Key Stage 2, each year group builds progressively on prior knowledge, ensuring a coherent and connected journey through mathematical concepts.

In Early Years and Key Stage 1, children continue their NCETM Mastering Number journey, with a particular focus on subitising—recognising quantities without counting. This approach strengthens number sense and lays the groundwork for future fluency. Meanwhile, Years 4 and 5 begin to explore unitising, a key concept that helps pupils understand how numbers can be grouped and regrouped, supporting their grasp of place value and multiplicative reasoning. A continued emphasis on multiplication facts in Years 3 and 4 ensures pupils develop rapid recall and deep understanding, which are essential for tackling more complex calculations and problem-solving tasks later in their mathematical development.

Beyond the Curriculum - Visits & Visitors, Parents & Pastoral, Clubs & Competitions:

As part of our wider curriculum, pupils from across Year 5 and 6 have had the opportunity to take part in a Bikeability programme. Bikeability is the government's national cycle training programme. It helps children learn practical skills and understand how to cycle on today's roads, giving them the confidence to cycle and enjoy this skill for life.

Bikeability cycle training equips children with vital life skills. Pupils not only learn to cycle, they gain independence, social skills and a sense of wellbeing. As a result of Bikeability sessions, children are better at responding to risk and report increased confidence, particularly when cycling independently. As a result, more children cycle to school which in turn improves mental health and wellbeing. This allows children to get more out of the classroom, improving their attention span and engagement. Healthier habits lead to increased attendance and improved academic results.

In essence Bikeability goes beyond a training course; it impacts children's lives and as such we are proud to offer it at Spalding Parish. Whilst we have completed our sessions for this academic year, it is our intention, given our commitment to ensuring children have the relevant skills for life, including road safety, that this will continue in the future. Vision, Values, Diversity, Equality and Inclusion:

Next Wednesday, 1st October, sees the start of Black History Month. Black History Month is an annual celebration honoring the achievements and contributions of Black people throughout history, with the month-long observance taking place in February in the United States and Canada and in October in the United Kingdom. Founded in the United States by historian Carter G Woodson, it began as Black History Week in 1926 to highlight the overlooked accomplishments of African Americans and later expanded into a month-long event in 1976. The celebration serves to educate and promote understanding of Black culture, challenge racism, and celebrate the rich heritage of Black communities globally.

This year's theme for BHM in October is "Standing Firm in Power and Pride" with the message of this year's Black History Month clear: unity is strength. Despite challenges and differences, there is beauty and power in shared heritage. And so, as the community reflects on its history, it is also being called to action — to embrace that power, to speak it loudly, and to stand together in unity and pride.

Over the course of the this academic year, we will be considering the achievements and contributions of a number of courageous advocates, linked to our focus of 'Making a Difference' and considering the difference those individuals have made. Within October we look forward to also celebrating Black History Month.
